



During the trip, the two start a relationship that cripples once they arrive at their destination, Aquae Sulis. Gwen meets Arthur there. And despite their differences in the beginning, they eventually get along, and together start to look for Excalibur. This sword holds the key to solve the mysterious origin of Britannia and to mend the magic veil that protects the island, which Mordred is trying to destroy.

La bruja del agua (The witch of the water)

The new balance reached in Britannia thanks to the creation of the Round Table tears apart when Gwenn is captured by Meleagant, who's taken to Gorr, the beta version of the simulation. Gwenn won't take long to discover that the Avalon ladies are behind this kidnapping, since they want to test her to see if she has the gift to become one of them.

Grial (Grail)

I had been thinking about it for a while. Maybe, trough Facebook it was easier for me to relate to other people. What if I became someone else, with a fake name? It would be like starting from scratch — at least online. At the time I reckoned it was a brilliant idea, but now I think about what I did and see it like it really was: absolute stupidity.

Being someone else on the internet looks like a game. So, if you don't like who you are, why not make up a character? Or make up the person you really want to be? It's easy, funny, without consequences. But the internet is not too different from real life: the fingers that press the keys are human, attached to real people – people with faces, with lives that can get entangled with yours, for good – or evil.
